

Miss Bryan Resigns As Home Demonstration Worker Here

Quits Post to Assume Duties As State Agent; Miss Stanton Successor

Miss Rose Ellwood Bryan, for more than 10 years home demonstration agent for Durham county, has resigned and Miss Vena Stanton, of Surry county, today was named to succeed her.

Miss Bryan turned in her resignation following her appointment as state agent at large, and the board of county commissioners appointed Miss Stanton upon the recommendation of state home demonstration officials.

The change will be made just as soon as Miss Stanton can obtain her release in Surry county, where she holds a position similar to the one she will assume here. County Manager Newsom said the change would go into effect "not later than February 1."

Miss Bryan, whose work here has brought her wide recognition, was appointed state agent at large some time in December, but withheld announcement of her plans until her successor was chosen. She was appointed by Miss Ruth Council, state demonstration agent.

Although Miss Bryan could not

be reached for comment today it is understood that she will continue to maintain her residence here, despite the fact that her work will carry her to all parts of the state.

Miss Stanton conferred here this
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morning with Miss Anamerle Arant, from whom she received her recommendation for the local post, and then left immediately for Surry county to turn in her resignation. She is expected to report here as soon as she can leave her job there.

Miss Bryan's work has influenced all sections of the county, the curb market of the farmer's exchange being one of her ideas. Each year, the project brings in thousands of dollars to Durham farm women through the sale of their produce.

One of Miss Bryan's most recent triumphs was the victory of one of her 4-H girls, Mary Frances Thompson, in the national canning contest at Chicago.

Regarding her successor here, County Manager Newsom said that Surry county has developed into one of the foremost counties of the state in the home demonstration field under Miss Stanton, who was regarded as being the woman best fitted to fill Miss Bryan's place.

Prior to being named home demonstration agent for the county, Miss Bryan taught home economics in the Mangum township and Bethesda schools.
