Report of School Attendance Work done by the Board of
Charities and Public Welfare during Month of September 1, 1932
County of Durham, North Carolina.

WHITE SCHOOLS:

HILLDALE:

9/19/32.

Call at school in response to a telephone call. Intv Mr. Tilley, also Mrs. Wiley and two other teachers, Mrs. Wiley reported that McLendon Browning was absent from school today, and that he had been absent several days already. Mrs. Wiley stated that McLendon was absent about one third of the time last school years and that she would like to have him straightened out so that he would attend regular this year. No other violations reported.

Called at home of Mr. Eugene Browning. Intv Mr. and Mrs. Browning regarding McLendon, they stated that he left home in plenty of time this morning to catch the bus, but came back and said he missed it. Mr and Mrs. Browning were told that possibly McLendon was having the nine o'clock headache as his mother stated that he was not at all well. Mr. Browning stated that he thought possibly that was the trouble. Boy was told that he must get away in time to catch the bus in the morning, and Mrs. Brown was instructed to be sure that boy attended school regular or the case would have to be brought into court if he was as irregular as he was last year. Both parents stated that they would see that boy attended regular in the future unless he was sick.

9/30/32

Mr. Tilley called over phone and reported that he was having some trouble with Clifton Blalock, and that he had gone home soon after getting to school this morning. Mr. Tilley ask that a call be made to the home and see if the matter could be straightened out and boy brought back to school. Mr. Tilley stated that he had sent the Janitor in his car for Clifton, but his mother would not let him come back to school.

Called at home of Clifton. Intv Mrs. Blalock, also boy. Mrs. Blalock stated that Clifton came home and told her that the boys had been letting the air out of his bicycle tires and that they had broke the light on it, and that they messed up his lunch today so that he could not eat it, and as he did not have any money for lunch he came home. Mrs. Blalock stated that she wanted to do the right thing, but that she felt the boys were going a little too far with their pranks, or whatever they would call them, and that she told the Janitor to tell Mr. Tilley she wanted to see him before she would let Clifton go back and have some understanding. Mrs. Blalock was asked to let Clifton go back to school so that he would be marked present today and let Mr. Tilley bring him home this afternoon and talk the matter over. Mrs. Blalock agreed to this and boy was taken back to school.

Called at school. Intv. Mr. Tilley and after explaining how Mrs. Blalock felt about the matter Mr. Tilley stated that he would take Clifton home and talk with the mother after school. No other violations reported. Mr. Tilley reported later in the day that he went to the home and talked with Mrs. Blalock and that everything was straightened out alright.

GLENN SCHOOL:

9/24/32.

Mrs. Barrett reported that John Henry Briggs was out of School on account of not having been vaccinated and that she understood his parents were not going to have him vaccinated, and ask that a visit be made to the home and see what could be done about the matter.
