Our mission to encourage discovery, connect the community, and lead in literacy drives every aspect of our work. To encourage discovery we recommend great books, field computer questions, and connect people to the resources they need. Free library programs create accessible opportunities for learning through hands-on activities and human connection.

## CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS

Total attendance of 93,835

Among the thousands of children's programs offered, the library's signature lapsit storytimes for babies continue to help caregivers strengthen young children's early literacy skills through music, movement, play, and stories. Free enrichment and intergenerational programs help families make learning together a regular practice.

## TEEN PROGRAMS

Total attendance of 10,756

Dedicated teen librarians engage young people in an array of programs as well as volunteer and leadership opportunities. Ericka Hill, Teen Librarian at Stanford L. Warren Branch Library, partnered with Duke Professor Dr. Martin P. Smith to offer *Young Scholars Brotherhood: Race, Power & Identity from Ali to Kaepernick*. In this multi-week program, young boys and men studied race, power, and identity, while also practicing college preparation skills, public speaking, creative writing, and career exploration.

## Older Adult Shut-In Service (OASIS)

OASIS serves individuals unable to visit our libraries due to age, illness, physical disabilities, or confinement. OASIS staff visit private residences, nursing and rest homes, retirement communities, senior centers, detention facilities, and prisons, bringing books and resources to check out, as well as programs and activities to teach and entertain.

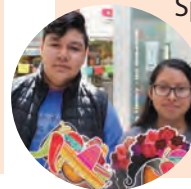


## Community Partnerships

Strong partnerships help us amplify our work.

As Chair of the Summer Reading Committee, Placidia Miller, Adult Services Manager at South Regional Library, led the team that partnered with the Friends of the Durham Library and GoTriangle/GoDurham to place a Little Free Library at Durham Station Transportation Center downtown.

Monica Belford, Hispanic Services Coordinator, connected with the Durham Lions Club to bring free vision screenings in both English and Spanish to children at the library. Screenings are offered once a month on a rotating basis at each of the libraries.

critical thinking, and culminating in author and historian Sarah Vowell's keynote at the Carolina Theatre.

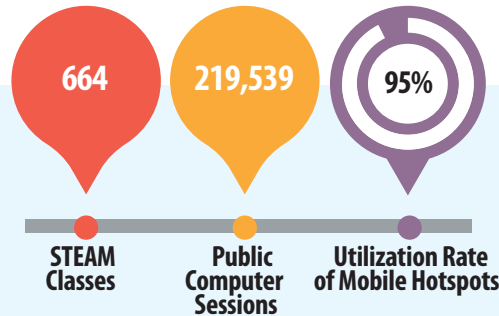
## Family Literacy and Community Services

A part of the library's Community Engagement Unit, Family Literacy and Community Services offers programs such as *Get Set, Get Ready, Let's Read!*—storytimes in home childcare programs. *Library Youth Partners* trains teens to present science and literacy-based storytimes to elementary school students. The bookmobile visits community settings including childcare centers, preschools, public schools, clinics, shopping centers, apartment complexes, and grocery stores.

Access to computers, mobile hotspots, free WiFi, and technology classes helps bridge the digital divide in Durham.

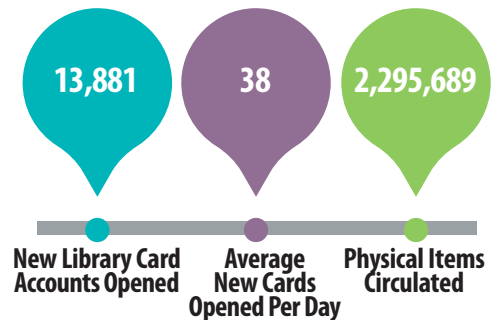


In the first year of a pilot program at Stanford L. Warren Branch Library, mobile hotspots are available for checkout.



### Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM)

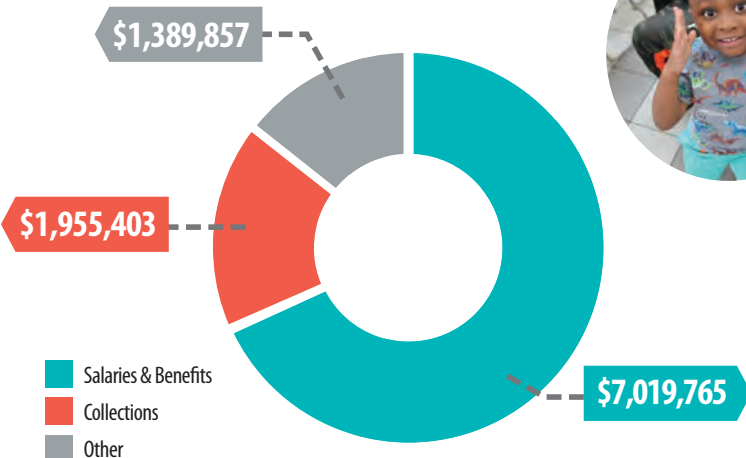

### Exploring Languages at the Library

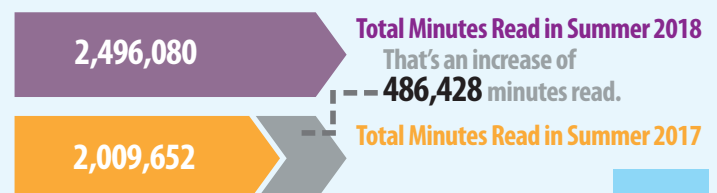

# STAFF RECOGNITIONS AND AWARDS

The 2017 Henry "Clay" Allen Service Award was awarded to **Olivia Singleton**, Children's Services at Southwest Regional Library. This award was created in 2007 to honor the memory of Mr. Henry Clay Allen and is given each year to a staff member who symbolizes the hard-working and enthusiastic spirit of Mr. Allen, who worked for the library for 19 years.



In June 2018, **Jenny Levine**, Humanities & Adult Programming Coordinator, was named a Paul Harris Fellow by the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. This award is given "in appreciation of tangible and significant assistance given for the furtherance of better understanding and friendly relations among peoples of the world." In addition to this honor, *Public Libraries* published two of Jenny's book reviews – one each in their January/February 2018 and May/June 2018 issues.



In November 2017, **Annie Mountcastle**, Grant Writer & Library Liaison to the Friends of the Durham Library, personally received an Ella Fountain Pratt Emerging Artists Grant from the Durham Arts Council.



# FRIENDS OF THE DURHAM LIBRARY

The Friends of the Durham Library is a volunteer-run nonprofit whose mission is to raise and expend funds for materials, services, and programs not normally in Durham County Library's operating budget. Through the sale of memberships, big book sales at Books Among Friends in Northgate, and ongoing book sales at the regional libraries, Stanford L. Warren Branch Library, and the Durham Co-op Market, a strong team of dedicated volunteers with tremendous community support achieves that mission.

Staff academic scholarships were among the many worthy things the Friends funded in FY18. This year, the Friends awarded two

scholarships, each for \$2,500 and renewable for a second year. These scholarships help nurture and encourage talent within the library and sustain a culture of lifelong learning. LaShaunda Rogers and Larkin Coffey won the 2018 scholarships. Both staff members are pursuing master's degrees to become librarians. These scholarships are just one example of the many ways the Friends help the library achieve our mission to encourage discovery, connect the community, and lead in literacy.

Durham Library Foundation was founded in 2001 by visionary Durham County citizens as an independent, 501(c)3 non-profit organization to develop and encourage the long-term financial health and growth of Durham County Library. Durham Library Foundation supports the library by helping to fund several signature initiatives that the library could not otherwise offer through its annual operating budget:

- Humanities programming brings nationally recognized authors and world-class scholars to thousands of library customers, and is a model for other library systems around the state.
- North Carolina Collection is a resource for historical records of the city and county of Durham.
- *Summer Reading*, the most popular Durham County Library program, reaches thousands of readers each summer.

- *Library Youth Partners* trains high school-aged teens to become leaders in spreading the benefits of literacy throughout the community.
- *Go For Launch!* From April 2017 to April 2018, Durham County Library hosted six *Go For Launch!* events, wherein students in grades 8 through 12 worked with an astronaut and other experts in the STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) fields to design an experiment that could be conducted in space.

Students presented their experiments, and, in each event, a winning group was named. After all of the events were complete, one experiment was chosen as the overall winner from the Durham *Go For Launch!* series. In late 2018, that experiment will be launched into space on a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket to be conducted on the International Space Station!
