ADVANCEMENT

The Merit Badge Counselors, Board of Review, and the Court of Honor come under the Advancement Committee. This Committee in the Durham Division serves all Troops in the Division. In Merit Badge Advancement as well as in all other Scout Advancements, the four processes of PREPARATION, EXAMINATION, REVIEW, and AWARD are involved. The following are a few rules and recommendations, with reference to these processes, that are observed by this Committee:

PREPARATION

The preparation for advancement takes place right within the Scout's own Patrol. In many instances the Patrol Leader himself helps him along, in others, a boy who has already attained the rank for which he is aiming may be assigned as his "buddy" counselor and will aid him in his training. The Scoutmaster should, of course, keep watch over the boy, for he recommends the boy for examination and review. Your more mature judgment and your knowledge of the abilities and natural interests will help the boy to benefit more substantially from the Merit Badge program than if he were permitted to set out alone on the uncharted sea. When the boy's mind has been made up, you may help him to secure source material on his subject.

The Merit Badge pamphlets and other books at the Stanford L. Warren Library will furnish the basis for his study, will guide him toward personal exploration and performance. Then, when he has a good start, he should be put in contact with the Merit Badge Counselor in that particular subject--BE PREPARED.

EXAMINATION

When the Scout is confident that he is ready for the final examination, he makes out a Merit Badge application, secures his Scoutmaster's approval, and gets in touch again with the Merit Badge Counselor. This time he brings with him all materials, statements, articles, pamphlets, etc., as required for the examination and the application form for the Merit Badge, properly filled out. Also another Scout to be the "victim" if demonstrations are called for.

If he meets all the requirements as set forth in the official Handbook, or Merit Badge pamphlet on that subject, satisfactorily the Counselor will certify that he has taken the examination and is entitled to the award, after proper review.

The actual examination for the Second Class and First Class Requirements is given by a Troop Leader of the rank of Junior Assistant Scoutmaster or above, as designated by the Scoutmaster.

REVIEW

BOARD OF REVIEW. The Board of Review is held on the second Tuesday of each month at the John Avery Boys' Club, 508 Fayetteville Street, at 8:00 p.m.

Registration Cards. Each Scout is required to present his registration card at the Board of Review before being reviewed.

REVIEW FOR MERIT BADGES. Scouts seeking Merit Badges are to present their cards to the Board of Review showing that they have completed the requirements for the desired Merit Badges. These Scouts will be checked for registration and rank, and to see if they contacted the proper Merit Badge Counselor.

MERIT BADGES WILL NOT BE REVIEWED EXCEPT WHEN THEY ARE AN IMPORTANT PART OF THE REQUIREMENTS FOR STAR, LIFE, AND EAGLE RANKS.

REVIEW. For review, the boy appears before the District Board of Review at one of its regular sessions. Here he is asked questions by various members as to what he has done, and how the examination was given; the purpose of the review being to probe the Scout's practical knowledge, his ability to apply what he has learned as well as his Scout spirit. The Board does not re-examine and does not necessarily require the repetition of actual demonstration of skills and knowledge called for in the examination.

The length of time required for this review will depend upon the number to be reviewed. In a very few instances should it consume more than half an hour, candidates for subjects may be reviewed in groups--or preferably, singly, each individual candidate being asked enough questions to justify the certification for the award sought.

If the review has been satisfactory, the boy is recommended for his award. Otherwise, he must be re-examined before he may again appear before the Board of Review.

Good reviewing methods should measure the Scout's ability to make practical application of what he has learned; should be a standard experience for all who are exposed to it; should be thorough; should provide individual treatment; should be a happy experience for the boy and the man; should strengthen the boy's confidence in the adult leadership of Scouting; should foster self-reliance; should emphasize Scout advancement as preparation for service; and should complete the process of meeting the requirement.

AWARD

COURT OF HONOR. Finally, the Scout is presented with his award at a ceremonious session of the District Court of Honor, at which time he meets other Scouts from other Troops and other outstanding men of this community. And, then, at the next Troop meeting, the wise Scoutmaster will see to it that his achievement is recognized by his fellow Scouts, and the Troop shows its pride in his accomplishment and expresses its wishes for his continued success.

The Court of Honor is held on the third Thursday of each month at 8:00 p. m. For the time and place, watch the local papers "City News Briefs" column for announcements on the third Wednesday and the third Thursday of each month.

Absence from Court of Honor. Any Scout up for an award and misses 3 or more consecutive Courts of Honor, will have to be re-examined and appear before the Board of Review before the award is made.

Uniforms. Scouts should wear their uniforms when attending the Court of Honor.

COURT OF HONOR OPENING CEREMONY

CHAIRMAN: "Scout Smith," (the Scout upon facing Chairman, salutes) "what is the first duty in opening the Court of Honor?"

SCOUT: "To display the Flag, Sir."

CHAIRMAN: "Appoint your Color Guard, retire, and present the Flag."

The Flag is brought in folded in the Color Bearer's arms. Flag bearer and guards unfold the Flag, holding it vertically in front of the table on which it is to be laid, being careful that it does not touch the floor.

(Practice at Troop meeting). All give the Pledge of Allegiance and the Flag is draped carefully on the table.

CHAIRMAN: "Scout Smith," (Scout salutes) "what is the second duty in opening a Court of Honor?"

SCOUT: "To display the Bible, Sir."

CHAIRMAN: "Display it."

The Scout brings in the Bible and places it open on top of the Flag.

CHAIRMAN: "Why is the Bible displayed in a Boy Scout Court of Honor?"

SCOUT: "The Bible is displayed because it is the source of all Truth from which the principles of Scouting are derived."

All join in the Scout Leader's Prayer. This can be sung to the tune of Marcheta or simply repeated together. It is worth the effort to have the Troop learn to sing it under a good teacher. Sometimes a member of the Church Choir might sing it as a solo while the Scouts stand with bowed heads.

"Our Father in Heaven above us we ask Thee
For guidance in our daily task.
May virtue and manhood stand strongly amongst us
To Thee we give all of our thanks.
The Scout Oath, the Scout Law,
These lessons unfolding
To our Youth in numbers untold;
Our motto, our good turn,
May we live and teach it,
Great Spirit of Scouting, we pray."

CHAIRMAN: "Scout Smith," (Scout salutes) "what is the third duty in opening a Court of Honor?"

SCOUT: "To repeat the Scout Oath, Sir. ATTENTION, SCOUTS AND SCOUTERS.
Give the Scout sign, and repeat with me the Scout Oath."
(All salute and take seats.)

CHAIRMAN: "I now declare this Court of Honor open."

CLOSING CEREMONY

CHAIRMAN: "Scout Smith," (Scout salutes) "what is the first duty in closing a Court of Honor?"

SCOUT: "To return the Bible from whence it came." (Removes the Bible.)

ALL STAND while the Color Guards fold the Flag and march off with it.
(Upon return, Scouts salute chairman, return to your places, and remain standing.)

CHAIRMAN: "Now let each Scout place his hand on the shoulder of the Scout on his right to represent the endless Brotherhood of Scouting and let us repeat together the Scout Leaders' Benediction:

"MAY THE GREAT MASTER OF ALL GOOD SCOUTS BE WITH YOU TILL WE MEET AGAIN."

CHAIRMAN: "I now declare the Court of Honor closed."

Merit Badge Counselors are chosen from among the finest men and outstanding leaders in their respective vocations or interests. They are persons who believe wholeheartedly in Scouting to the extent of making their valuable time available to Scouts eager for advancement. They are technical experts, persons of outstanding character, tact and judgment.

Their job is not just to test a boy's technical knowledge of Merit Badge subjects, but to give the boy a vision of what is behind it, to uncover, for the boy's use, his qualities of initiative, to assist him in evaluating his Merit Badge work in terms of his Scout life and his general activities, and put merit into Merit Badge, through a tie-up with the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

No Troop is 'going on the rocks' if over the years it has developed a systematic plan for recruiting new Scouts to fill the gaps as they occur and to add new members to the Troop. It is important that the age distribution of the members of the Troop be watched. At no time should any age group become preponderant, rather there should be a balance with eleven-year-olds coming in to replace the older Scouts. The Commissioner should regularly check this point with the Scoutmaster to know the facts. This matter of systematic recruiting is very important. SCOUTMASTERS, HAVE YOU PLANNED A PROGRAM ON THESE?: RECRUITING, GROWTH, AND REPLACEMENT. Why not start a program of recruiting one new Scout per Troop each month?

MR. SCOUTMASTER:

DO YOU WANT YOUR TROOP MEETINGS TO ATTRACT AND HOLD THE INTEREST OF YOUR SCOUTS?

DO YOU WANT YOUR TROOP TO BE THE BEST IN DURHAM?

DO YOU WANT YOUR SCOUTS TO HAVE A WELL ROUNDED PROGRAM?

DO YOU WANT EACH OF YOUR SCOUTS TO ADVANCE AT LEAST ONE RANK THIS YEAR?

The secret of this and the ease of reregistering your boys rests with the use of the Scoutmaster's three assistants--PROGRAM NOTEBOOK, SCOUTING MAGAZINE, and BOYS' LIFE.

TURN TO THE NOTEBOOK. Right now, turn to your Program Notebook. Start on Page 3, and read through the six steps on planning successful meetings, outdoor activities, as well as improving spirit, participation and advancement:

1. Find Out What Your Scouts Want.
2. Plan Around Their Wishes.
3. Organize Their Wishes.
4. Hold A Troop Planning Conference.
5. Use the Program Aids.
6. The Staff Plans the Details.

Your program should be "boy planned". This means that every Scout should have his say in what goes into the program. At your next meeting, take the first step. Then, follow through on the other five. You will soon find that the Troop will shape up as it never has before.

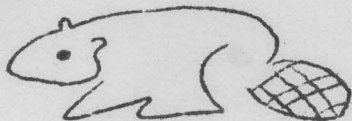
