<b>Abstract:</b>	The Jean Bradley Anderson Papers span the years 1934-2012, with most of the material dating between 1964 and 2012. The collection consists of correspondence, research notes, copies of original manuscript material and secondary sources, photographs, clippings, print material, oral histories, and ephemera. The bulk of the collection is made up of extensive material related to the research, writing, and publication of various published works, including both editions of Durham County. The collection also contains material relating to courses Anderson taught on genealogical research methodology, her work as a private researcher with the North Carolina Department of Archives and History, as well as her numerous endeavors on behalf of local historic preservation.
<b>Scope and Content:</b>	" The Jean Bradley Anderson Papers are organized into five series: Alphabetical Files, Monograph Files, General Research Files, Print Material and Oversize Material. The material ranges in date from 1934-2012 with a majority dating between 1964 and 2012. Materials are primarily composed of research materials, writings, correspondence, and other professional papers created during a career as a genealogist, historian, teacher, author and preservationist. Materials document the scope and depth of Anderson's intellectual interest in, and dedication to, local history through research, writing, and historic preservation. Most of the materials present relate to the research and publication of both editions of Durham County: A History of Durham County North Carolina, Piedmont Plantation: The Bennehan-Cameron Family and Lands in North Carolina (1985), The Kirklands of Ayr Mount (1991), and Carolinian on the Hudson: The Life of Robert Donaldson (1996). Source materials relating to the historic foundations, establishment, growth, and development of Durham city and county are present throughout the collection.

	<p>The Alphabetical Files series consists mainly of research material related to the publication of both editions of Durham County: A History of Durham County North Carolina. Among the myriad topics present include African-American history in the city of Durham, Durham County, and Orange County, including neighborhoods, cemeteries, cultural and professional life, families, slaves, and freemen. Other topics include land and land ownership; local businesses, institutions, organizations, and industries; cemeteries, mills, and churches; the history of medicine and medical practice in North Carolina; and contemporary topics such as Latin American immigration, HIV and AIDS, and the development of Research Triangle Park.</p>
	<p>A significant amount of material consists of hand-written research notes, research index cards, clippings and ephemera, family genealogies, interview transcripts, and copies of original manuscripts and records found in local repositories and private collections, including historic tax lists, censuses, deeds, and voter registration records from the 18th through the 20th century. There are also copies of secondary source material such as journal articles and unpublished biographical sketches and genealogies compiled and written by others.</p>
	<p>Numerous annotated drafts of vignettes, articles, and presentation papers written by Anderson are also present. Among the writings by Anderson are several biographical and historical sketches for William Powell's Encyclopedia of North Carolina. Materials relating to Anderson's activism with local preservation organizations and historic sites including Hill House, the Eno River Association, Stagville Foundation, and applications for several local historic sites to be included in the National Registry of Historic Places are present as well. Property and landscape improvement plans for Hill House can be found in the Oversize Material Series. Other materials document Anderson's activities as an independent researcher and genealogist, mainly correspondence with other manuscripts and records repositories and individual researchers. Prominent among them are correspondence with the Teer and Thompson families, the Cain family of Virginia concerning connections to the North Carolina Cains, and the Cirlot family of Mississippi regarding the Moores of North Carolina.</p>
	<p>A small number of photographic prints and negatives are found in this series and include images of historic structures, notable individuals, historical artifacts, and maps. Specific images include the N.C. Mutual building and several since-demolished historic homes including the Eric Tilley, Robert McCauley, and Patterson homes.</p>
	<p>The Monograph Series contains materials related to the research and publication of three monographs authored by Anderson, Piedmont Plantation: The Bennehan-Cameron Family and Lands in North Carolina (1985), The Kirklands of Ayr Mount (1991), and Carolinian on the Hudson: The Life of Robert Donaldson (1996). This series documents Anderson's in-depth research into the Bennehan-Cameron, Kirkland, and Donaldson families. Types of material present include research notes and index cards; genealogical material; copies of family records and manuscripts including correspondence, land deeds and grants, and plantation records; and research documenting the homes, grounds, and furnishings of Ayr Mount and Stagville. The Cameron family material contains several notepads of hand-written research notes. Collectively the Cameron notepads serve as a chronological family timeline consisting of references to and quotes from family letters, deeds, wills, and newspaper articles. The series also contains correspondence relating to various aspects of publication: permissions to publish images, communications with publishers, and peer reviews. Also present is a small amount of material documenting Anderson's work with Historic Stagville that includes correspondence, meeting minutes, tour narratives, and improvement plans.</p>
	<p>The General Research Files Series contains newspaper extracts, oral histories, and research notes on index cards. Newspaper extracts consist of several undated legal note pads comprised of hand-written notes taken by Anderson from local historic newspapers. The notepads begin in 1886 and conclude in 1944. Topics noted include local events and happenings, births and deaths, stories concerning prominent local families, politics and government, the tobacco and railroad industries, schools and churches, civic improvements, and crime. The oral histories consist of interviews with Fanny and Lewis Paulton (1982), Ema Isalina Rippley Perry (1972), and Cat Belvin, grandson of Billy Duke (1975). Use copies of each interview are available in Box 26. The index cards contain notes on local families including the Carr, Hill, Mangum, Vickers, Southgate, and numerous others; notes taken from local land deeds; the physical presence of and technological developments in the tobacco industry; entertainment and amusements including the theatre and music; and the construction of business buildings, neighborhoods, and private homes in Durham.</p>
	<p>The Print Materials Series consists of periodicals, newsletters, and Anderson's 1941 yearbook from the Agnes Irwin School. A UNC Press catalogue, Eno River Association calendars, and a 2009 Historic Durham calendar are also present. Periodicals include issues of Southern Accents, Town and Country, Classic Home, and The Magazine, Antiques. Newsletters deal primarily with historic preservation and include Carolina Comments, North Carolina Preservation, and</p>

	preservation and include Carolina Comments, North Carolina Preservation, and Association for the Preservation of the Eno.
	The Oversize Material Series contains mostly historic maps and family genealogies. The maps include facsimiles of an 1860 map of North Carolina Railroad property, an adaptation of D. G. McDuffie's 1890 map of Durham, and a 1951 geological survey map of Durham with locations of historic family homes and lands labeled and handwritten notes on the reverse. Detailed genealogies of the Harris, Kirkland, Parker, and Thompson families are also present.

<b>Restrictions:</b>	A small number of unpublished papers are restricted. Otherwise, the collection is open for research.
<b>Biographical/Historical Note:</b>	Jean Bradley Anderson, a resident of the Durham area since 1955, is a historian, teacher, professional genealogist, and pioneer Durham and Durham County preservationist. Anderson graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a BA in English from the University of Pennsylvania, received an MA from the same institution, and has taught the subject at Duke University and North Carolina Central University. She was a founding member of the Historic Preservation Society of Durham, now known as Preservation Durham. She has been active in numerous other local preservation efforts including the Eno River Association, Historic Stagville, and Hill House. She is the author of numerous books on local history including Durham County: A History of Durham County, North Carolina, commissioned by the Historic Preservation Society of Durham, now in its second edition; Piedmont Plantation: The Bennehan-Cameron Family and Lands in North Carolina commissioned by the North Carolina Division of Archives and History in 1948; The Kirklands of Ayr Mount, originally commissioned by the then-owner of Ayr Mount, Richard Jenrette, in 1985; Carolinian on the Hudson: The Life of Robert Donaldson, and Campus Club, Duke University: A History.
