<b>Scope and Content:</b>	The Durham Civil Rights Heritage Project Collection contains approximately 125 photographs depicting scenes of civil rights activity in Durham, primarily donated by Durham resident and Duke University graduate Bill Boyarsky and by Harold Moore, Herald-Sun newspaper photographer. It also includes 16 oral history interviews with participants in Durham's Civil Rights Movement. Interviewees discuss life under segregation, their involvement with the movement, and the movement itself.

<b>Biographical/Historical Note:</b>	The Durham Civil Rights Heritage Project (DCRHP) was founded to document the photographic history of the Civil Rights Movement in Durham. Oral histories of Durham's civil rights era were also collected by the project. Project organizers held their first meeting May 1, 2003. The group sponsored three "collection day" events open to the community—at the Durham County Library, Hayti Heritage Center, and St. Joseph's AME Church. Sixteen stories were recorded and nearly 125 photographs were collected from private individuals and professional photographers. The DCRHP used the materials gathered to create a public art project of 11, 6' tall banners hung in artful handcrafted frames. The banners incorporated photographs, quotes from interviews with local people, and text to depict some of the history of the Civil Rights Movement in Durham. The banners traveled to schools, malls, libraries, storefronts, and other locations for over 10 years and now reside in the Stanford L. Warren Library, a branch of the Durham County Library on Fayetteville street.
