Rigsbee and portraits of people taken in Tennessee, Ohio, and Durham. Based on the style of dress and the other materials in the collection, the majority of the portraits are likely from the early 1900s. |

| Biographical/Historical Note: | The Rigsbee family is one of the oldest families in Durham. Clarence Dixon Rigsbee was born in Durham in 1879 to John V. and Mary Leigh Rigsbee. Clarence's grandparents were Jesse and Mary Rigsbee, who were some of the first settlers in what is now Durham, and their farm land became part of Duke University's west campus and the present day Ninth Street area of Durham. Clarence married Mary Almina Underwood, who was originally from Ohio, in 1902. It is likely that the portraits from Ohio are of members of Mary's family. They had three children, Edith, Clara, and John. A couple of Durham portrait studios are represented among the photographs in the collection, including the Holladay Studio and the Johnson Studio. The photographs are a good representation of a family in Durham's style of dress in the late 1800s and early 1900s. |
